

#### Home learning






### Katie in Scotland


### Martha Maps It Out

### Big City Atlas

With a globetrotting penguin as our guide, in The Big City Atlas we embark on a world tour to 28 different cities. With each city offering something completely new, whether it be showing the local cuisine, traditions or landmarks, readers are given a taste of what life might be like there.
